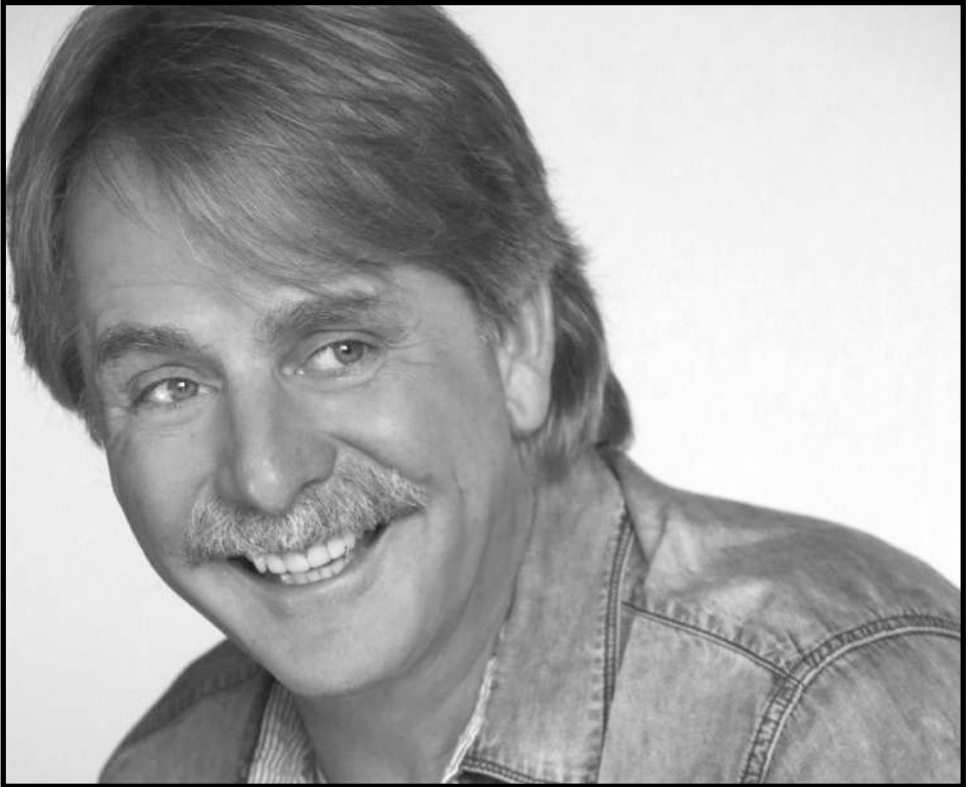

Starting fee, overnight events \$25.00. Money division and fees in Stake races as in published conditions. (DOC MAIRS AND MAX KISTER MEMORIALS \$100 STARTING FEE, DAY OF RACE.) In overnight events, no more monies will be paid than there are starters.
- 1A. Starting Gate will score five wide. Will start 6, no more than 7, if 8 or more entries, heats will be held.
2. Signature Series Doc Mairs Memorial Trot, Ohio owned and sired preferred. 4 yrs old and up. Take top seven money earners in 2024. One Division.
3. Signature Series Max Kister Memorial Pace, Ohio owned and sired preferred. 4 yrs old and up. Take top seven money earners in 2024. One Division.
4. All Owners, Trainers and Drivers should be members of the Ohio Harness Horsemen's Association for insurance purposes.
5. Starters must be declared by 11:00 A.M., DST, 3 days preceding date race is scheduled to start. The Society reserves the right to reject any entry, to change program, and to declare off any race, or rearrange programs as conditions require. The Society reserves the right to invoke preference rule.
6. Eligibility Certificates and Starting Fees, as well as **OWNER'S SOCIAL SECURITY NOS.**, will be required in the Racing Secretary's Office before any winnings will be paid.
7. If in any race there are more declarants than can be scored in two tiers, elimination heats will be raced without adding.
8. Winnings will be paid at Secretary's Office as soon as possible after race is finished. Checks must be cashed no later than November 30, or winnings will be forfeited to the Society. No straw furnished. Stalls will be assigned.
9. Horses brought on the grounds at owners' risk. Society assumes no liability for accidents, losses, injuries to person, animals or equipment on track or Fairgrounds.
10. \$100 to the driver of the horse breaking the track record at either gate. In case of tie to be decided by flip of coin. In case more than one horse breaks record, to go to fastest time.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This society shall be known by the name of **WAYNE COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY**.

Article II. The Board of Directors for the management of the society shall consist of twenty-one members, whose terms of office shall be for three years, and until their successor is elected and qualified. Newly elected directors shall assume the duties of their office at the regular meeting in November following their election.

Election of Directors shall be conducted according to rules prescribed by the Ohio Department of Agriculture. The society shall secure a notary public, judge, or mayor to administer the following oath (or affirmation) of office and to induct newly elected directors into office. The President of the society shall administer the oath to the newly elected directors in the absence of any of the above officials.:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Ohio, laws of Ohio and the rules and regulations of the Department of Agriculture of Ohio pertaining to Agricultural Societies and to the best of my ability perform the duties of Director of the Wayne County Agricultural Society, so help me God."

Eight directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Any officer or member who shall be absent himself for three consecutive meetings unless such absence shall be satisfactorily accounted for, shall thereby vacate his office. The tenure of office shall be so arranged that the terms of one-third of the members shall expire annually. The OSU Wayne County Extension Educator(s), County Commissioners and County Engineer shall be ex-officio (non-voting) members of the Board of Directors.

Article III. The Board of Directors, at the regular November meeting each year, shall organize by the election of President, Vice President, General Manager, Secretary-Treasurer, and Auditing Committee, consisting of three, whose terms of office shall be one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. Only members of the Board of Directors shall be eligible to the office of President and Vice President. Any member of the Society shall be eligible to the Auditing Committee. Any suitable person shall be eligible to the office of General Manager, Secretary-Treasurer. The Board shall approve all committees and officers not otherwise provided; have the general supervision of the construction and management of the grounds, buildings and driving track of the Society; have the power to vacate the office of any officer therein for good cause at any regular meeting of the Board and shall have power to fill vacancies at the same time.

Article IV. On the last Saturday in October, annually an election shall be held in the Society's room to fill the vacancies in the Board of Directors, occasioned by the expiration of the term of one-third the members. Only bona-fide members of the Society shall be entitled to vote. Candidates for members of the Board of Directors must be members of the Society in good standing, have satisfactory background checks OR may present a conceal and carry license or certificate or similar report that has provided a similar background check, with valid ID, and must qualify for election according to the rules of the Ohio Department of Agriculture. The Wayne County Agricultural Society may pay for the check.

Article V. In order to become entitled to membership in the Society, an applicant must be twenty-one years of age, a resident of the county, in good moral standing, and pay to the Treasurer of the Society an annual fee as fixed by the Board of Directors of the Society.

Article VI. It shall be the duty of the President, and in his absence the Vice-President, to preside at all meetings of the Board and enforce rigid observance of the constitution and by-laws.

Article VII. It shall be the duty of the Manager, Secretary-Treasurer to keep a record of the proceedings of the Board, to issue membership tickets to members of the Society, keep a record of the names and addresses, and give members 3 weeks notice of time and place of election of Directors. They shall return all unsold tickets to the Auditing Committee, taking their receipt therefore. They shall record all entries for premiums, receive all monies due to the Society, and deposit same in a depository selected by the Board of Directors. They shall pay all bills on approval of the Board of Directors. They shall make a written report to the auditing committee at the close of each day of the number of tickets sold during said day. They shall report annually at the regular meeting in December, an itemized statement of all receipts and disbursements, and pay all monies in his hands belonging to the society to their successor when duly elected and qualified.

They shall make a report annually to the Ohio Department of Agriculture as required by law, and shall perform such other duties as are required by law and usage, and as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors of the Society. Before entering upon their duties, they shall provide a bond for the faithful discharge of their duties in such amount as may be deemed expedient by the Board, the premium on such bond to be paid by the Society. They shall receive for their services such compensation as deem proper the Board of Directors of the Society.

Article VIII. The Wayne County Agricultural Society shall provide police protection during the Wayne County Fair.

Article IX. The General Manager shall take charge and control the Society's grounds, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

Article X. It shall be the duty of the Auditing Committee, at the close of the year's business, to audit the Secretary-Treasurer's books, inspect other pertinent records, and report the result of its findings to the Board of Directors.

Article XI. The annual exhibition of the Society shall be held on such days as shall be fixed by the Board.

Article XII. The Board of Directors shall have the power to adopt rules and regulations to govern and control the annual exhibition of the Society.

Article XIII. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held the third Saturday of December and January at 1:00 p.m. and the third Monday evening of February, March, April, May, June, July, August, October and November at 8:00 p.m.

Article XIV. This Constitution may be amended in accordance with rules and regulations prescribed therefore by the Ohio Department of Agriculture.



RULES AND REGULATIONS

IT IS THE DUTY OF ALL EXHIBITORS TO CAREFULLY STUDY THE
RULES AND GOVERN THEMSELVES ACCORDINGLY

1. On the payment of twenty dollars (\$20.00) and a Valid ID, a membership card and six single tickets will be issued, which will entitle the owner to enter any number of animals or exhibits in accordance with the rules following. The membership card without a ticket does not admit to grounds, but will entitle members to vote at the annual election. Memberships must be secured on or before the last day of the fair.
2. All entries close **the 2nd Saturday in August at 12:00 p.m.** except as otherwise specified in Premium Book. **NO ADDITIONAL ENTRIES OR CHANGES WILL BE TAKEN AFTER THAT DATE.**
3. Ten per centum of first place premium offered will be charged on all entries of livestock (unless otherwise stated). Entry fees must be paid when entries are made, otherwise, entries will not be accepted.
4. In order to avoid errors and save time, please complete the entry form at the back of the Premium Book or on the fair website, www.waynecountyfairohio.com, prior to making your entries at the Secretary's office. Unless the entry is made in the classification in which the article is named, no premium will be awarded. Exhibitors must determine for themselves in which classification they will make their entry.
5. Every animal or article must be exhibited in the bona-fide owner's name, and should any competitor violate this rule, he shall not receive a premium, should one be awarded.
6. No animal exhibited will be allowed to be removed without the consent of the Department Superintendent and the official Fair Veterinarian, until after designated released times as stated in rule #46 or 10:00 p.m. on the last day of the fair. No displays or articles exhibited will be permitted to be removed before 8:00 a.m., Friday after the exhibition unless otherwise specified. **Please see rule #46 for release time specifications.**
7. Every animal or exhibit on the grounds entered for premiums, shall, during the Fair, be under control of the Superintendent Department in which it is entered, and no stock shall be allowed to run at large on the Fairgrounds or exercised in high traffic areas and midways.
8. Exhibitors will be expected to obey the Department Superintendent in presenting their stock when instructed to do so, and persons refusing or failing to comply, may be ruled out from competing.
9. Any person entering stock of any kind and misrepresenting its age, condition or ownership, will forfeit the premium and be excluded from competing for up to 3 years at the discretion of the fair board.
10. Exhibitors are required to have all **exhibits** entered on the books at the Secretary's office before they can be assigned to their respective departments.
11. Cards will be furnished corresponding with the entry on the Secretary's books to accompany all animals and **exhibits** on exhibition.
12. Each entry shall specify the exhibitor's name, post office address and the name and age of the animal or **exhibit** offered.
13. No animal can compete in more than one class except as one of a pair or herd.
14. Exhibitors must see to the delivery of their animals or **exhibits** upon the grounds and to the proper Department Superintendent at the proper time.
15. The Board will take every precaution in its power for the safety of the visitors and the safe preservation of stock and **exhibits** on exhibition after their arrival and arrangement upon the grounds, but will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident that may occur. Exhibitors are requested to give attention to their **exhibits** during the Fair, and at the close to tend to their removal.
16. Purity of blood of stock must be established by pedigree. Genuineness of pedigree of cattle and sheep will be decided by herd books and registers of acknowledged authorities of their respective classes.
17. Evidence will be required that animals exhibited as breeders are not barren.
18. No stock will be permitted to enter the ring, unless under halter and or in care of a groom.
19. Horses, cattle and sheep will be exhibited in the ring, prepared for the purpose, and the premium ribbons or cards attached by the Judges before leaving the ring **unless otherwise specified.**
20. No awards will be made on any breeding animal that is barren or has any transmissible unsoundness.
21. All manufactured articles must be exhibited by the manufacturer or agent, and all grains, flowers, and fruit or vegetables to be exhibited by the owner.
22. An efficient security force will be on the grounds at all times to maintain order.
23. If animals occupying stalls are not exhibited in the ring at the call of the Department Superintendent, or at the time of their class as stated in the program of the day, exhibitor will be charged five dollars per day for stall rent and be excluded from competition or forfeit any premium previously awarded, unless upon written excuse from the Department Superintendent of the respective department, the official Fair Veterinarian, and approved by the Fair Secretary.

24. **THE SOCIETY RESERVES THE RIGHT TO PAY THE PREMIUMS, WHICH MAY BE AWARDED FOR THE EXHIBITION, PRO RATE, PROVIDED THERE ARE NOT SUFFICIENT FUNDS (AFTER PAYING ALL THE EXPENSES OF THE SOCIETY) IN THE TREASURY TO PAY IN FULL.**
25. When animals or exhibits are not deemed worthy of a premium, the judge will make no award even though there be no competition.
26. No person other than members of the Board, or Department Superintendents, will be allowed to see the entries or have access to the entry books until after the entries close.
27. All entries and awards will be made in strict compliance with the offered premium list.
28. It is the duty of all exhibitors to carefully study the rules and govern themselves accordingly. Any information will be given in regard to exhibiting in any of the classes by the members in charge or the Secretary.
29. **The following items are not permitted to be sold, displaying of or given away as prizes: Paraphernalia used for drug use, inappropriate or obscene pictures or lettering, live mammals, Guns, knives, swords or replicas of weapons, confederate Flag and or memorabilia.**
30. No interference or communication with the judges will be allowed and any person who by letter or otherwise attempts to influence the decision of any judge shall forfeit any or all premiums which may have been awarded, and ruled out of competition.
31. If there is any question as to the regularity of entry, or of the right of any animal or any exhibit to compete in any given class, the judges shall report the same to the Superintendent of the department, and they to the Secretary for adjustment.
32. The judges must not attach premium cards to exhibits for which no premium is offered.
33. The Society invites all persons having stock to sell or animals to bring before the public to exhibit at our annual Fair.
34. Premiums will be paid no later than 30 days from the last day of the fair. **Anyone challenging their premium check, must do so within 15 days after receipt. No adjustments will be made for less than \$1.00.**
35. **All premiums not drawn by the 30th of November of each year will be forfeited to the Society. This rule will be enforced to the letter.**
36. First Bedding **MAY OR MAY NOT** be furnished by the Fairboard.
37. The sale of alcoholic drinks of any kind on the grounds is strictly forbidden during the annual fair exhibition. From time to time during the other times of the year (other than the week before, the week during and the week following the annual fair exhibition), the board may consider allowing the sale of alcoholic drinks for specific groups or specific events but the activity or specific group must be able to show they have obtained a permit and carry adequate insurance and have security hired at this event within the guidelines of the fair board. No games of chance, gambling, or any immoral exhibitions of any kind are allowed on the grounds at any time unless approved by the Board of Directors.
38. "No person shall be permitted to make solicitations of any nature on the fairgrounds except in contracted concession or commercial rented spaces." **"No person will be permitted to post or display signs, distribute handbills or advertising material or sell or distribute free, any merchandise, except persons under contract."**
39. The Wayne County Fair Board reserves the right to limit the number of exhibits per exhibitor. The Wayne County Fair Board reserves the right to limit the number of exhibitors.
40. Kiddie Tractor Pull will be Sunday, during the annual fair exhibition, at 2:00 p.m., at a specified location. Classes will include: 4-5 yr. old, 6-7 yr. old and 8-9 yr. old, or other classes that may be added at the discretion of the board in certain instances or celebrations. **New for the 175th Fair - Celebrity Pull 18-50 yr. olds and 51 yr. olds and over.** Trophies will be awarded to the top 3 boys and 3 girls in each class. **Open to Wayne County Residents Only!** Interested parties may sign up one hour prior to the event.
41. Our fair will operate under the provisions of Ohio's Livestock Show Reform Act and under all applicable Ohio Department of Agriculture Administrative Code Rules. This law and the amended rules may be viewed and or secured at the secretary's office.
42. The Wayne County Agricultural Society assumes no responsibility for damage to or loss of parked vehicles or personal property contained within parked vehicles.
43. **The Wayne County Agricultural Society shall follow the rules of the ADA and specifically specifies all wheel chairs will be of standard size as stipulated by ADA. In effect the purpose of this bylaw is to alleviate the non-standard sizes of wheel chairs.**
44. Protest Peaceful Demonstration Area - The designated area to be West of the red ticket booth at gates 5 & 6 in the area that is planted with flowers at fair time, which would be the Southside of the blacktop path coming from the SouthWest parking lot.

45. No small animals are permitted on the Fair grounds unless they are determined to be service animals or are 4-H or FFA fair entries. All fair entries must remain in their designated areas while on the grounds on their specific show day(s) during the fair.

46. **Release Rules Revised for 2022**

Release Times:

- After 9:30 PM on Thursday night, only rabbits, poultry, sheep, and goats are released from their assigned pens and cages to be walked out of their assigned barn and off the fenced-in fairgrounds.
- After 10:00 PM on Thursday night, all animals are released from their assigned pens/stalls to be walked to a trailer at their designated barn loading area or the infield within the fenced-in fairgrounds
- After 11:00 PM on Thursday night, all animals are permitted to be walked off the fairgrounds.

Rules:

- On Thursday night, all animals are to be in their assigned pens/cages/stalls by 8:00 PM (i.e. no "exercising" or "consolidating" animals) until their designated release time unless excused by the fair veterinarian and Department Superintendent per General Fair Rule #6.
- All animal release times are the same for Sr. and Jr. Fair exhibits.
- Each animal department committees will be patrolling their barns in teams of no less than two adult volunteer members and will report any infractions of the above rules to their Sr. or Jr Fair Superintendent.

Enforcement:

- Jr and Sr Fair animal exhibits/exhibitors in violation of the release times will be dealt with congruently
- Any exhibitor in violation of the exit times will share the violation at the family level
 1. The family will be suspended from exhibiting any Sr. or Jr. Fair entry at the Wayne County Fair for up to 3 years. The suspension will be at the discretion of the Wayne County Agricultural Society (Sr. Fair Board).
 2. If the family had entries participating in the Jr. Fair Sale, the project will be sold at the current turn price. Any proceeds above the turn price will be forfeited. These proceeds will be moved to the general 4-H scholarship fund.
 3. If the family participated in the dairy products auction, all proceeds earned will be forfeited. These proceeds will be moved to the general 4-H scholarship fund.
 4. All Jr. Fair and Sr. Fair premiums will be forfeited and or returned upon request.
 5. The family will be considered not in good standing with the Wayne County Fair and OSU Extension
 - All family members will be removed from any active volunteer status
 - Exhibitors-will not be eligible to apply for 4-H scholarships.

Grievance:

- Any person found in violation of any rule may, at their choosing, and in accordance with the protest policy as written, offer a rebuttal. The exhibitor in violation will need to follow the Protest Policy as published in the Fair Book.

Additional Clarifications for other Rules/Policies/Procedures to assist with the above:

- To aid in the rule announcement, signage will be applied to all the exhibit barns.
- There will be no parking on the track at any time on Thursday. Only infield parking will be allowed on the west side after 4:00 PM or after the last horse race. If the infield parking is full, any additional vehicles will not be permitted on the grounds until 10:00 PM.

47. **Registration of Golf Carts and Utility Vehicles** will have 3 designated specific named passes which will be administered by the fair Secretary and staff in the fair office. Generally all golf carts and utility vehicles must be removed off the main fair grounds between 9am and 10pm daily (unless designated differently below). All operators must be the age of 18 with a valid driver license. Owners of any golf carts and utility vehicles must have and carry their own property and liability insurance. The following are the specific passes designated at the Wayne County Fair:

1. **Fair Board, Fair Director Emeritus, OSU Extension, and Fair Staff passes** will allow access to any area of the fair at all times and especially when deemed necessary to continue the administration and operations of the daily fair activities.
2. **Exhibitor Passes** shall be used and provided specifically to allow exhibitors to stock their exhibits before 9am in the morning and or after 10pm in the evening. These are very specifically limited.
3. **Vendor Passes** shall be used to stock supplies at the vendor(s) specific location and at times provides an EMERGENCY STOCKING option to be on the grounds between 9am and 10pm.

4. **The use of handicapped designated golf carts and utility vehicles** will be at the discretion of the Wayne County Fair board to specifically designated areas on the grounds. Travel on the grounds will be limited during high traffic times when more than normal danger of accidents may occur in large crowd areas. Consideration will also be given to the specific handicap especially in emergency or life threatening instances when it may be necessary to proceed and provide this service during high traffic times and thru large crowds.
48. **The Sheriff, any first aid, and emergency vehicles will have access to any/all parts of the fair grounds at any times as deemed necessary for the security and wellbeing of the general public and fair goers.**
49. **All livestock and vending trailers shall be parked at all times in designated areas as per map shown as EXHIBIT M. Failure to park in designated areas shall cause the fair board to tow these miss parked vehicles at the cost of the owners and the fair board will not be responsible for any damage caused by the towing.**
50. **Drones are strictly prohibited at any/all times unless permission is granted by both the fair board and Sheriffs department for the security and wellbeing of the general public and fair goers. Specific passes shall first be approved and secured by both the fair Secretary and Sheriff's department. Violators will be punished to the full extent allowed by the laws governing the use of drones.**
51. Protests, grievances, accusations of cheating, misconduct, violations of rules, fraud, deception, or any other form of misconduct must be made in writing, signed by party or parties making protest, and filed with the **Wayne County Senior Fair Manager or the Junior Fair Superintendent or Junior Fair Secretary** accompanied by a protest fee of \$100.00, which will be retained by the Wayne County Agricultural Society if protest is not sustained. The **Senior Fair Liason & executive committee or the Junior Fair Liaison Committee** shall hear **the respective** protests with the appropriate committee(s). All protests will be considered at a time set by the **Senior or Junior Fair Liaison Committee** and all parties will be notified. **Senior Fair or Junior Fair Species Committees and the Building 10 Committee** are not required to pay the \$100 protest fee when a majority of the committee agrees that a protest should be filed and the committee is the party bringing forward a protest.

ADMISSION TO GROUNDS

Membership tickets will be issued to persons complying with Article V of the Constitution. This membership ticket includes six admissions to the fair and entitles the holder to one vote at the annual election.

2024 SEASON/OHIO'S LIVESTOCK HEALTH EXHIBITION RULES

901:1-18-01 Chapter's application.

- (A) Animals, when moved within or imported into Ohio solely for exhibition purposes, shall comply with the requirements of this chapter.
- (B) Animals described in paragraph (A) of this rule who are in compliance with the rules of this chapter are exempt from the other rules governing movement within or importation into Ohio except for the rules governing movement and importation of quarantined animals.
- (C) Animals imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code. (Last update March 8, 2024)

901:1-18-02 Definitions.

As used in this chapter:

- (A) "Approved veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio department of agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture or the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services.
- (B) "Certificate of veterinary inspection" means a form from the state of origin, which has been issued and completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian attesting to the health status and identification of an animal listed thereon.
- (C) "Contagious or infectious disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.
- (D) "Department" means the Ohio department of agriculture or its designee.
- (E) "Exhibition" means any public show of animals, which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society organized under Chapter 1711. of the revised code; or the Ohio state fair; or which is assembled for a period which exceeds thirty-six hours or contains animals of origins other than Ohio.
- (F) "Licensed and accredited veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the state of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is approved by the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services, to be an accredited veterinarian.
- (G) "Residue" means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180 (2017), any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6 (2017), or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556 (2017).

901:1-18-03 Exhibitions: sanitation, inspection and records.

- (A) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an approved veterinarian for the duration of the exhibition.
- (B) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:
 - (1) Under the direction of the approved veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition immediately prior to the exhibition;
 - (2) Have the approved veterinarian:
 - (a) Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;
 - (b) Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for symptoms of any infectious or contagious diseases; and
 - (c) Inspect each animal daily that is present at the exhibition for symptoms of infectious or contagious disease.
 - (3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibition. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal and the species and breed of the animal.
 - (4) Order the immediate removal of any animal which, in the opinion of the approved veterinarian, places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
- (C) The department may grant an exemption from paragraph (B) (1) of this rule upon request and for good reason.

901:1-18-04 Exhibitors.

- (A) No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is infected with or has been exposed to a contagious or infectious disease or residue.
- (B) The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or the department.
- (C) Each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal, shall present any certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificates, vaccination certificate, and other documents to exhibition officials, the approved veterinarian or the department upon request.

- (D) Each person who presents an animal for exhibition or exhibits an animal for which a certificate of veterinary inspection is required by the rules of this Chapter shall forward a copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection to the department.
- (E) Failure to comply with the rules of this chapter may result in the department taking action pursuant to section 941.10 of the Revised Code or issuing a quarantine order until such time that the violation has been removed.
(Last update March 8, 2024)

901:1-18-05 Poultry and fowl.

- (A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must either:
 - (1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the national poultry improvement plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirements of this paragraph;
 - (2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirements of this paragraph;
 - (3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio department of agriculture and found negative.
- (B) The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraphs (A)(2), (A)(3) and (A)(4) of this rule.
- (C) Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

901:1-18-06 Cattle.

- (A) Cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) All cattle imported into Ohio for exhibition must comply with rule 901:1-17-03 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-07 Goats.

- (A) Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.
- (B) Goats imported into Ohio for exhibition must comply with rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-08 Horses, mules, asses, and ponies.

- (A) Horses, mules, asses and ponies moved within Ohio for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of any infectious or contagious disease. If the animal is twelve months of age or older, the exhibition may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for the equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition.
- (B) Horses, mules, asses and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition shall comply with rule 901:1-17-07 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-09 Sheep.

- (A) Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition
 - (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.
- (B) Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition must comply with rule 901:1-17-08 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-10 Swine.

- (A) Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) Swine imported into Ohio for exhibition shall comply with rule 901:1-17-09 of the Administrative Code.

*** Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code (Ohio's livestock tampering exhibition rules) will be made available to a livestock exhibitor or an adult advisor, upon request.***

Entries are confined to Wayne County residents of six months or more and tractors and trucks owned in Wayne County. Any tractor, truck or driver that participated in any other closed county pull will not be allowed to pull in the Wayne County Pull. Tractors that pull Saturday cannot pull Monday. All classes are open to ladies and men 18 years of age and older. Entry fee will be \$10.00 for each entry. Entries may be made at the Secretary's office at the fairgrounds starting July 22, 2024, during regular office hours. Entries will close at 4:30 p.m. DST on August 10, 2024. **No entry fees will be returned.** Each tractor may be entered in more than one class, but only once per class. Drivers can enter only once per class. All contestants and owners of tractors and trucks will enter the contest at their own property and personal liability risk. All contestants and pit crews will be required to sign an insurance waiver before pulling will be allowed. **No Exhibition Pulls.** **Consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited. No additional vehicles permitted into the infield.**

The judges and committee have full power to decide all questions pertaining to the contest. They will determine the winners and award prizes according to the following rules. Their decisions are final. They reserve the right to change the rules as needed. Money will be mailed to winners.

GENERAL RULES FOR CLASSES A, B, C, F, and G

1. All tractors must cover their engine flywheel with 5/16" or more steel. Must have 12" on both sides and bottom and 6" on top (12" if possible) and fastened with 3/8" grade 5 bolt or bigger. Can use S.F.I. SPEC 4.1 Certified approved scatter blanket. A technician will check all tractors.
2. Only farm tractors with rubber tires are eligible. Tire chains, 4-wheel drive tractors, homemade tractors, industrial tractors and dual-wheeled tractors will not qualify. CHASSIS MODIFICATION WILL BE SUBJECT TO TECHNICIAN APPROVAL.
3. Weights must be bolted safely and securely to the tractor to the satisfaction of the judges. Fluid may be used in tires. Maximum length of 13 feet from center of rear wheel to forwardmost portion; maximum width 10 feet. The loss of ballast while pulling and going to scales will automatically disqualify the entry.
4. Any tractor with turbo is required to have 2-5/16" bolts crossed in exhaust stack, unless equipped with OEM muffler. **ONLY ONE TURBO PER TRACTOR.**
5. All classes may shift if desired without stopping forward motion.
6. Each tractor entered must hitch to a horizontal stationary drawbar, with no connection to any part of the 2 or 3 point hitch or hydraulic system.
7. No hitch will be made closer than 18" behind the center of the rear axle.
8. Drawbar height will be 20" in all classes.

9. Pull will be made from a steel plate with a 3.5"L x 3"W hole only, with a minimum thickness of 3/4". No weights can block the hitch so it cannot be hooked from the front of the sled.
10. Maximum tire size is 20.8. No cut or ground off tires.
11. Only one driver will be allowed on the tractor — no passengers permitted. No substitutes, tractor or driver.
12. The driver must remain on the tractor seat at all times while pulling in the contest.
13. **All tractors will be weighed immediately before pulling. Driver must be on the tractor when weighed. Weigh back will be at the discretion of the judges and committee.**
14. A driver will be allowed a second start but they must attempt to stop before 75 feet.
15. Contestant must move the sled at least 10 feet to be eligible for prize money.
16. Chain must be tight before pull starts.
17. When forward motion stops, the contestant is finished.
18. Judges will eliminate from the contest any tractor which may be temporarily disabled in such a way as to prevent it from immediately participating in the contest when called.
19. Drivers must be on tractors 5 minutes before the class starts. **Drivers will be disqualified if they miss their drawn position. EXCEPTION! If your pull is one of the last three in the preceding class, you can drop back to behind No. 3, but no further.**
20. Weight will be added by a weight transfer mechanism as the sled progresses.
21. Winner will be determined by the distance pulled.
22. If the tractor or sled touched boundary lines, the contestant will be disqualified. Flaps on pan are not part of sled.

ADDITIONAL RULES FOR CLASS A, B & C - STOCK TRACTOR

1. The sled operator will sound first horn when tractor reaches speed limit. The competitor has 5 seconds after horn blows to keep it at 5 mph. The driver will get a second horn if they exceed the speed limit. The competitor has 5 seconds to maintain the 5 mph speed limit or less, a third horn will sound and the competitor will be disqualified.
2. "Bolt In" Engine Allowed. Must Use Original Holes.
3. Agriculture Use Engine Only
4. Turbo allowed if equipped from factory. Factory Size Turbo Only.
5. All General Rules Apply.

ADDITIONAL RULES FOR CLASS D – HOT FARM TRACTORS

1. Must have Wide Front End, minimum 36" inside to inside of front spindles.
2. Side shields required. 1/16" Aluminum or Steel MINIMUM. Covering From Centerline of the Crank to the Base of the Head.
3. Affidavit will be signed for "Not running Cast Parts in the clutch and flywheel". No cast iron clutch components or flywheels will be permitted.
4. Tie Bars- A steel structure that will support the weight of the tractor. The bars will fasten to the frame and/ or engine block, ahead of the flywheel area and to the rear axle housing. Rolling chassis fastened to the rear axle housing will be accepted. EITHER at the discretion of the tech official. NO Component Chassis.
5. Wheelie Bars Required. Needs to be 2" past radius of the rear tire and no more than 8" above the ground. Must support the weight of the tractor.
6. Dead man throttle required.
7. Kill switch required, securely mounted at the rear center of the tractor.
8. Cut or ground tires are allowed, 20.8 maximum width.
9. All General Rules Apply.

RULES FOR CLASS E STOCK AND MODIFIED

Stock or Modified 4-wheel or 2-wheel Drive Pickup Trucks to 6,200 lb.

Stock Trucks: D O T tires, manifold, no headers, stock 4 barrel carburetors, stock intake. Only gasoline or diesel fuel. Engine must have been available for the truck the year it was manufactured. Blocks between axle and frame optional.

Modified Trucks: All Others — No hood modification, stock fuel.

1. Modified trucks must have operable kill switch securely mounted in the rear center of the truck. If spark ignition, must break or ground ignition. Must also break current to electrical fuel pump if equipped. Diesels must activate air shutoff.

RULES FOR CLASS H AND I

1. MFWD Fixed Frame Only.
2. Matching Brand specific stock engine and fuel system must be on vehicle.
3. Only farm tractors with rubber tires are eligible. Duals are allowed, front and/or rear. Tracks, tire chains, 4-wheel drive tractors, homemade tractors, or industrial tractors do not qualify. No cut or ground off tires. NO CHASSIS MODIFICATION.
4. Weights must be bolted safely and securely to the tractor to the satisfaction of the judges. Fluid may be used in tires. The loss of ballast while pulling and going to scales will automatically disqualify the entry.
5. No rear 3-point attachments. Rear quick hitch must be empty.
6. Matching Brand specific 3-point front weights are allowed. NO front attachments.
7. Any tractor with turbo is required to have 2-5/16" bolts crossed in exhaust stack, unless equipped with OEM muffler. Must use model specific approved turbo.
8. Each tractor entered must hitch to a horizontal stationary drawbar, with no connection to any part of the 2- or 3-point hitch or hydraulic system.
9. Factory draw bar with tech approved clevis or hammer strap. Step drawbar must be in down position. Clevis must have threaded pin 1 1/4" thick.
10. No hitch will be made closer than 18" behind the center of the rear axle.
11. No weights can block the hitch so it cannot be hooked from the front of the sled.
12. Only one driver will be allowed on the tractor - no passengers permitted. No substitutes, tractor, or driver.
13. The driver must remain on the tractor seat at all times while pulling in the contest.
14. **All tractors will be weighed immediately before pulling. Driver must be on the tractor when weighed.**
15. **Weigh back will be at the discretion of the judges and committee.**
16. A driver will be allowed a second start but they must attempt to stop before 75 feet.
17. Contestant must move the sled at least 10 feet to be eligible for prize money.
18. Chain must be tight before pull starts.
19. All classes may shift if desired without stopping forward motion
20. When forward motion stops, the contestant is finished.
21. Judges will eliminate from the contest any tractor which may be temporarily disabled in such a way as to prevent it from immediately participating in the contest when called.
22. Drivers must be on tractors 5 minutes before the class starts. **Drivers will be disqualified if they miss their drawn position. EXCEPTION! If your pull is one of the last three in the preceding class, you can drop back to behind No. 3, but no further.**
23. Weight will be added by a weight transfer mechanism as the sled progresses.
24. Winner will be determined by the distance pulled.
25. If the tractor or sled touched boundary lines, the contestant will be disqualified. Flaps on pan are not part of sled.

MILKING PARLOR

The Wayne County Dairy Service Unit, with cooperation from W.G. Dairy, Inc. is making every effort to provide exhibitors with satisfactory facilities for milking and the handling of milk at the fair. The milking parlor is an exhibit, which draws a lot of spectators and is a great public relations tool for the dairy industry. Your cooperation in helping to keep the parlor and cattle clean is important. Rinse/wipe cows off before coming to the parlor in the morning. **PLEASE DO NOT BRING DIRTY, MANURE-COVERED COWS INTO THE PARLOR.**

We are fortunate that milk sold from the fair meets Grade B standards; therefore, we cannot accept milk from the barns. All milk is tested for antibiotics before it is shipped. Individual producers' samples may be checked randomly for the presence of antibiotics. Any exhibitor supplying milk in which antibiotics are found will be barred from selling milk at the fair and will be held financially responsible for any milk that would have to be dumped.

The milking parlor will be under the direction of a supervisor in charge. The milking parlor will be open Friday, September 6th, for 1 hour, 5:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. The milking parlor will be available on non-show days from 5:30 a.m. to 7:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. unless special arrangements have been made with the parlor supervisor. On show days, the parlor will provide a flexible schedule to accommodate exhibitors. We understand that variances in milking time are needed to properly fill udders prior to showing.

The proceeds from the sale of milk during the fair is a source of income for the Dairy Service Unit.

The Dairy Service Unit Board will determine the cost of operating the parlor and its basic budget needs. DSU provides much support with scholarships, education, promotion, Dairy Products Auction and sponsorship of 4-H and FFA programs. These would not be possible without the income from the milk sold at the Fair.

We look forward to servicing you at the Fair and wish you success. Have an enjoyable Fair, and let's make a good impression — it sells more milk and dairy products.

The Wayne County Fair is proud to be in partnership with the Tree City Quilters' Guild in Wooster and local veterans in honoring our Wayne County Veterans. We welcome community support by entering quilts, or donations to the HOPS program to help with quilting expenses.

Requirements:

1. Quilts should be large enough to cover an average-sized adult. Entries should be no smaller than 55" by 70", and the ideal size is 60" by 80". If they measure that size, they will be registered with the Quilts of Valor site.
2. Items must be red, white/cream and blue in color.
3. All exhibitors in this category will be required to sign the waiver form acknowledging their agreement that their item will be gifted to a Veteran and that they are receiving no compensation for their donation. The waiver form will be in the Fair Board office.

Considerations:

1. If this is the only category you are entering, you will not have to be a member of the fair and pay the \$20 membership fee.
2. You may enter as many items in each category as you like.
3. The entries in this section will not be judged and no premiums will be awarded.
4. Items entered in the categories below will be on display in the Grange Rotunda during the fair until the time they will be presented to Veterans during a special ceremony held on Thursday of the fair.

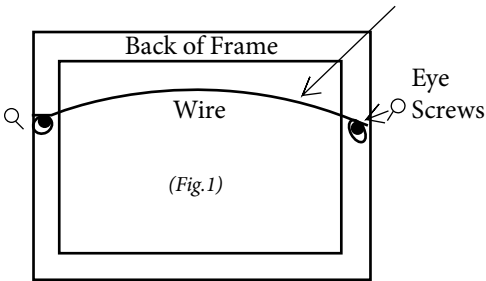
Wiring a Framed Piece

If frame is wood, place eye screw in each side of the back of the frame, then string wire between the two (Fig. 1). If metal, you can purchase accessory that attaches to each side of back frame, then string wire between the two. Keep wire below top of frame. Find in craft stores.

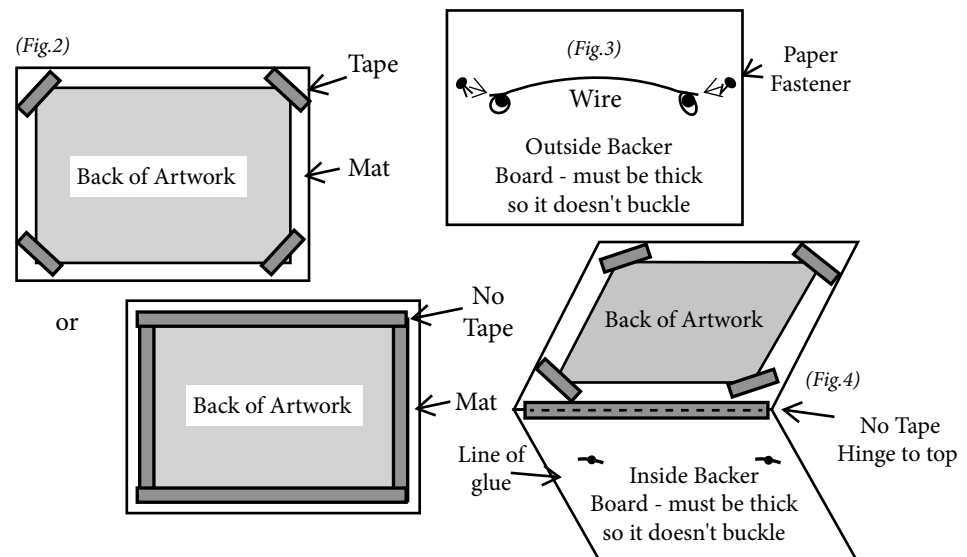
Mounting and Wiring an Unframed Piece

You will need a mat and a backer board. These can be purchased or made out of light weight cardboard. You will also need wire and masking tape. First attach the artwork to the back side of the mat with tape (Fig. 2), then poke two holes in the backer board on either side, in from the edge 1-2 inches. Insert a metal paper fastener, wrap one end of the wire around each paper fastener (Fig. 3). You can then hinge backer board to the mat at top with masking tape (Fig. 4). Close the two together and if you wish, tack with double sided tape, glue, or sticky putty.

Helpful Art & Photography Definitions

Abstract & Modern Interpretation - An exploration of color, line, texture, pattern and composition — can be strictly design or recreating an everyday object or subject using an abstract technique

Acrylic Pour - Acrylic pour is a painting technique where fluid acrylic paints are poured over canvas or other backing. By using various paint pouring techniques, you can create pools/puddles of color, as well as create marble-like effects. Pouring various colors of paint over each other and letting the paint run, creates patterns. When pouring the fluid paint, it appears smooth and glossy and can create some dramatic, abstract, and contemporary results. Whatever pouring techniques you use; you will need to adjust the acrylic paint by adding in the medium. The medium helps to change the consistency so it will pour smoothly and prevent any cracking once the paint dries. Once you have poured all of the fluid paint colors, the canvas is then tilted so the paint covers the entire surface, including the sides. And remember, do this in advance as it takes more time to dry than other forms of painting. It must be completely dry to be accepted into the Fair judging.

Assemblage - A medium that usually creates three-dimensional artwork with two or more pieces put together

Botanical - Flowers and plants

Building Study - Close up architectural details; main focus on building or structure; building(s) fill entire canvas

Collective Sketches - Sketches/drawings of different subjects or of same subject from different views or angles drawn or sketched together on same canvas, paper or art board

Computer Drawing - Drawings created with the use of a computer

Decorative Art - The design and decoration of objects that are primarily valued for their utility. Includes adding art to ceramics, glassware, jewelry, furniture, and clothing

Figure - Human; full body

Landscape - A natural scene of land or countryside

Perennials - Flowers or plants that live for more than two years and return year after year blooming on their own — common examples: Lilies, Tulips, Daffodills, (Brown or) Black-eyed Susans, Lavender, Hardy Mums, Cone Flowers, Blanket Flowers, Peonies, Sages, and Phlox, among many others

Portrait - Human; head to shoulders

Reflection - As in water, mirror, glass, any reflective surface

Seascape - A view of the sea

Silhouette - A dark shape and outline of someone or something visible against a lighter background

Steampunk - Victorian science fiction and fantasy featuring advanced machines and technology based on steam power of the 19th century

Still Life - A carefully arranged group of objects; example, flowers, fruit, pottery, pots, candles, etc

Street Scene - A building lined street may also include people, animals, etc —, within the scene

Underwater - Lying, growing, performing, operating below the surface of the water

Zentangle - Abstract drawing created using repetitive patterns — Usually black ink or pencil — sometimes combined with other mediums such as watercolor

RULES

1. Entries in the antiques show will be open **ONLY** to residents of Wayne County. Antiques dealers are permitted to enter.
2. All articles must be at least 50 years old and in a good state of preservation. Condition, rarity, beauty, and uniqueness are all factors of prime importance in the judging. The decision of the judges will be final in all cases.
3. Each exhibitor is limited to **no more than 10 items total** for the antiques department. Cup and saucer, creamer and sugar, salt and pepper shakers and certain items on a matching tray or holder will be considered one item. (**Department superintendents' decisions are final on this.**)
4. Entries must be submitted to the fair secretary's office between July 22 and August 10, 2024. Exhibitor tags will be issued and **MUST** be securely attached to each item **BEFORE** delivering your entries.
5. Claim checks **MUST** be detached from the exhibitor tag prior to bringing the item in for entry. Entrants **MUST** write a brief description of the item on the claim checks in order to make it easier for committee members to locate the item when it is returned at the close of the fair on Friday.
6. Items that in previous antiques competitions have been awarded a best of show cannot be reentered.
7. Exhibits must be delivered to the Grange rotunda between 10 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. on Friday, September 6th. Exhibits are to be in place until 7:15 a.m. on Friday, September 13, 2024 and **absolutely** will not be released without proper claim checks.
8. The management will not be responsible for items not picked up by 12:00 noon on Friday, September 13, 2024.
9. The exhibitor of an antique **MUST** be the **OWNER** of that antique. Antiques may not be borrowed for entry into competition. In any instance of dispute, exhibitors may be required to prove ownership of the entry.
10. Items entered must be of a size that can be easily moved about by one person without equipment.
11. All entries will be exhibited with what is deemed proper protection from handling errors and possible theft. The management will use all reasonable care to protect the safety of articles entered **but will in no way be held responsible for any loss, theft, breakage or damage that may occur.** In other words, if the article is priceless to you or an irreplaceable family heirloom, please do not enter it.
12. Out of all the first place winners, the judges will select 9 to receive Best of Show Awards. From those 9 Best of Show Awards, the judges will select 1 to receive the Judges' Choice Award.

FOURTEENTH DEPARTMENT EDUCATIONAL

INTRODUCTION

The Wayne County Fair School Exhibit has become an outstanding method for the schools in this area to promote public relations. This cooperative school display provides the motivation and opportunity for students to participate in an event that is an outgrowth of educational programs in their schools. A good school display requires the combined efforts of students, teachers and administrators.

GENERAL

1. Supervision of the Fair School Building is under the control of the Tri-County Educational Service Center
2. **All work must be student created and done at school or in connection with school assignments**
Principals, teachers, and superintendents, whenever requested to do so, must certify that:
 - a the work was done by pupils
 - b the work was done since the last preceeding fair
 - c the pupils are assigned to the grade level indicated on the entry
3. The exhibit is open to all public schools districts in Wayne County that participate in the Wayne County Fair Day
4. An individual entry fee is not required
5. **All projects must be the work of the student**
6. Ribbons will be awarded for 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th places and Honorable Mention
7. Ribbons will be issued to each individual who participates in a group project (The coordinator may issue four ribbons per project; however, additional ribbons may be requested for larger group projects)
8. Any monies paid as premiums to schools are to be expended for some useful or decorative purpose in the school building or on school premises, after expenses for making the exhibits are deducted from the school's premiums
9. All reasonable precautions will be taken to safeguard exhibits, but **neither the fair board or the Tri-County Educational Service Center will be responsible for losses**
10. The educational exhibits are further subject to all other general and special rules of this fair

JUDGING GUIDELINES

1. Exhibit items must follow the rules and guidelines (see below) or they will be disqualified by the judges
2. Judging of Elementary exhibits will take place immediately prior to the opening day of the fair and will be coordinated by the Tri-County Educational Service Center
3. Each school is responsible for bringing the students' materials and setting up their display prior to judging
4. All projects will be judged for overall message, general attraction and arrangement, originality and creativity, accuracy and presentation in light of age appropriateness and reflection of effort
5. High School entries in Industrial Technology and Visual Art will be judged prior to opening day in the School Exhibit Hall

EXHIBIT/DISPLAY GUIDELINES

1. ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE CLEARLY MARKED WITH NAME, SCHOOL AND GRADE
2. Perishable products, hazardous, illegal or unsafe paraphernalia are not to be displayed
3. Booths are 10 feet wide and railing brace supports allow for 16" depth to lay a platform board for floor level display

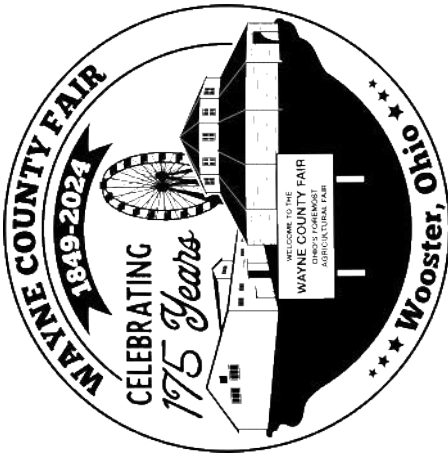
